Office of Safeguarding

Holidays are an exciting time to relax, slow down and step away from the routines and structures of the school term. Sometimes, this can cause children (or adults) to feel a bit worried, as the expected routines that make us feel safe are no longer there. It is also a time that children may spend more time in the care of others, especially for families where parents work during the school holidays. Ensure that your child knows they can always talk to you if they feel worried or anxious. Also, try to keep some routines, such as regular meal times and bedtimes. Too many late nights, or drastic changes in diet, can result in children becoming over tired and grumpy. Be aware of the ratings of movies, TV shows and games, and gauge whether they are appropriate for your child. Do not be caught up with your child saying "every else is allowed", it is the oldest trick in the book – I remember saying the same thing to my parents many years ago! When children engage in age-appropriate activities, they enjoy themselves much more and feel safe. My favourite thing to do during the July holidays is to have a PJ Day at home, watching a movie with my children while eating fish and chips! I look forward to hearing about everyone's holidays next term.

We learnt by watching and listening, waiting and then acting. Our people have passed on this way of listening for over 40,000 years...

There is no need to reflect too much and to do a lot of thinking. It is just being aware.

How can past families purchase tiles: They register with Flexi schools and for the class choose "Guest". If anyone requires more instructions I can forward to them.






St Therese's -Stage 3 Art Projects

During this semester 13 young artists have work tirelessly to understand and describe the statement

"To Live Life to the Full".

The statement was discussed, and each student came up with a phrase or word that would promote a healthy mind. This then became the focus for their artwork. Featured here are the artist statements accompanied with a photo of the artist with their masterpiece. Please come and see their work on the 17th July, details are opposite...







"True Colour"

My artwork represents life and mostly creation; because of all the creatures and the kids/ friends they have lots of meanings. The koala means the grey that many people hide, or in other words the darkness or selfishness. The termites mean the different territories that we all live in and support each other no matter what.

The squirrel represents the dignity and light in people that most of us do not tell but show. The boy and the girl represent all humans that need a chance to stand out, but do not get a chance to speak or have an idea on something very important. The image of the background represents a graveyard and how much colour is in the smallest things when you do not expect it. The whole image represents how life works and that there is always going to be colour. I used acrylic paints and a led pencil to sketch out my drawing at the start.

I created clay figures painted with water colour. The clay sculptures are fragile which is a connection to mental health seeing as the stability of one's mental health can also be fragile.

Setting: the pitch-black ocean underneath my clay represents the void/ ocean of depression the corrupted girl was once drowning in. Spiked jail bars in the back of my piece to represent how the girl had imprisoned herself and her mindset. These bars however, morphed into gates which have an opened lock on them, representing how she had a realisation that there was more to life, opening the doorway to a new path in her life journey (hence the path and sign beyond the gates).

Clay: The colourful mask which was ripped off represents how the corrupted soul hid under it, giving the impression that she was happy and ok when she was in pain. I have positioned the corrupted soul so that it looks like she had previously been crying and is now looking up towards the lifted spirit with optimism. To contrast, the lifted spirit is levitating looking down upon the sad soul beneath her, giving hope and relieving disbelief and despair (aka the floating aura between them). The positive spirit is guiding the negative spirit into a new way of life without constant tears and pain.

"Progression"

In this artwork there are three main characters. The two characters on the side represent community helping the main character in the middle of the artwork to get through mental illness.

I wanted the artwork to represent the phrase "don't let your fear's control your life'. In the artwork, a chest has been locked. The chest represents



locking away your fears and not letting them control you.

The two characters on the side are helping to keep the fears at bay and not letting them get on top of the main character. The background is yellow, yellow represents optimism, energy, happiness, and friendship which will help overcome mental illness.

The characters represent all of us in society, we all have our fears, doubts and times when we do not feel happy. It is in these time that it is important to have family and friends helping us.

'The Missing Piece'

My painting represents a puzzle with dark clouds, bright green grass leading towards blue light, a shining sun, mixed colours and a big puzzle piece.

The dark clouds represent bad thoughts, the green grass represents freedom leading to blue lights which represents being trapped and sadness. The bright shining sun represents all happiness.

The spectrum of colours represent mixed feelings. The moon and stars represent dreams becoming reality and the puzzle represents the mind. Vibrant words and details surrounding the revived pot, all to help and nourish them to a better lifestyle.

Gifted Education at St Therese's New Lambton



The staff at St Therese's work productively to create programs with high intellectual quality so that we meet the needs of all our learners, including those that are gifted and talented. This term, staff received Professional Learning on two areas of Gifted Education; Twice Exceptionality and Metacognition.

Twice Exceptionality refers to a type of giftedness where the individual is gifted as well as having a disability. At times, the disability can mask the giftedness, so as educators it is important we closely monitor those students who may be Twice Exceptional so they can reach their full potential. Albert Einstein is a classic example of a person with Twice Exceptionality, as he had a specific Learning Disability which was dyslexia but was also highly gifted! Teachers spent time learning from the new CSO document on Twice Exceptionality to deepen their knowledge of this type of Giftedness.

The second area the staff spent time reflecting on is how we use Metacognition in our daily teaching and learning. To put it simply, Metacognition is when students are aware of their thinking processes when learning. This is particularly during the processes of planning, monitoring and evaluating their learning.

For example, when a student writes a narrative(story) they use the thinking processes of:

Planning

- What ideas do I have?
- What resources do I need?
- How can I make this narrative entertaining?


Monitoring

- What feedback have I been given that I need to work on?
- Have I used the language, structure and grammatical features of the text?
- Have I edited my writing?
- Am on track with this task?

Evaluating

- Did this story entertain the reader?
- What areas do I need to work on?
- What did I find challenging?
- How can I improve for next time?

Students who develop skills of metacognition have the advantage of managing their learning as they have an awareness of their thinking processes. They can plan, monitor and evaluate when undertaking a task. Importantly, they know how to use feedback to improve their skills. As teachers, we scaffold the steps of a task, use questioning and verbalise the thinking processes to model metacognition. Next time your child self-corrects when reading, celebrate, as this is an example of metacognition! They have shown an awareness of their thinking when reading by fixing their error.
